## Criminology

"What is crime? Why does it occur? And what are the best ways to address it?" asks Dr Donna Marie Brown, associate professor in criminology, Durham University. Covering topics including policing, prisons and youth justice, criminology students learn about criminological theory, the roles of criminal justice agencies and the impact of crimes on victims and communities. Now in its ninth year and stretching to 88 universities, our Criminology table reflects this growing undergraduate field, offered by 159 universities and colleges across 1,225 courses for 2025–26, either by itself, as part of a joint honours degree, or within a broader social science degree. Sociology and psychology are welcomed by some university departments, but there are no specific entry requirements for criminology degrees, apart possibly from GCSE  $\,$ maths, since the course is likely to involve the use of statistics.

Loughborough has ousted Durham at the top of our Criminology table, a position it last held three years ago. Loughborough performs strongly across all metrics without coming first in any individually. In second place overall Sheffield does best for graduate job prospects based on 82.8% of its criminology graduates being in high-skilled work and/or further study within 15 months. Kent comes out top for research in our analysis of the latest Research Excellence Framework 2021. Wrexham, in 10th place overall, has the most satisfied criminology students for the second year running - outdoing all others in the table for teaching quality and the broader experience - both measures derived from the National Student Survey. Surrey, Worcester and Bedfordshire also feature in the top three for these student-led measures.

Career opportunities further down the line include in the police force, prison service, Home Office, charities or law practice. But overall, criminology comes second from bottom of our employment index (though this represents a one-place improvement on the last two years), where it is held back by the almost equal proportion of graduates that start out in low-skilled jobs (36.2%) as in high-skilled employment (37.2%). Average early career salaries of £23,000 compare more favourably with other subject areas, and criminology ranks =61st out of 70.

## **Dentistry**

The increasing demand for dentistry degrees continued to climb in 2023 when applications were up 18% year on year, to over 23,100. The number of dental school places available is capped by the government, as with medicine, and in 2023 1,505 dentistry students began courses. Career prospects are reliably positive. Dentistry remains the No 1 most lucrative option for graduates, with a median starting salary of £42,000 according to the latest figures. Although graduate outcomes are not as consistently high as for medicine, most graduates (88.4%) from five-year dentistry courses are in a high-skilled job as a dentist or enrolled on postgraduate study within 15 months - which ranks dentistry sixth in our employment index (down three places this year).

Queen's, Belfast retains the lead in our new Dentistry table for the second year running, while Glasgow – which topped it for seven years before – is steady in the runner-up spot again this year. With just 15 undergraduate dental schools across the country, this is one of the smaller and more stable subject rankings and this year's table differs very little from our previous edition, albeit with some reshuffling, such as Bristol moving up to third place from fifth, and Birmingham shifting down from =10th to 14th.

The dental school at Queen's has been delivering dental education in Northern Ireland since 1920. It has the highest average entry grades in the UK (179 UCAS points), sits fourth for research and second for student satisfaction with the broad experience, as well as fourth for teaching quality - both measures derived from our National Student Survey analysis. Dundee and Liverpool each achieve perfect 100% rates of graduate employment in high-skilled jobs and/ or further study 15 months after degrees. King's College London is top for research but bottom for student satisfaction with teaching quality, while Manchester students expressed the lowest rates of satisfaction with the wider experience. The table is dominated by older universities, with only Plymouth and Central Lancashire representing the modern university sector.

"With growing evidence linking oral and general health, a sound understanding of biological sciences - in addition to practical skills - is essential to diagnose and manage dental conditions," comments Professor Ewen McColl, head of the Peninsula Dental School, University of Plymouth.
